Practicing art with children





The main aim is to help children to make a connection between creativity, the ability of using their hands and visual space.





The first step starts by looking, feeling, discovering form and shapes and colours.
Then comes practice with the children.

Some projects are mainly focused on creating visual art.

However, it depends on the group's capabilities which could even encompass conceptual art – something which has rarely been attempted before.



Example projects

Pomegranate

Age: 2-3

Process:

Observing the real object (first-hand experience)





Asking them to feel see and describe it, this is the process of understanding. By describing, they become more involved with the subject. Questions about the forms, shapes and colours they see. (Visual understanding)

Finally, asking them to paint:

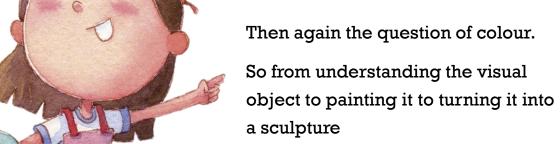
l draw the shape

2 ask for any colour they think they see in the pomegranate

They are free at all steps so they may choose brown or even blue because this is what they see. All is possible.



The next step of the project is to create a volume. This is more complicated and it is a complete 3D creation.

The main topic was mostly the

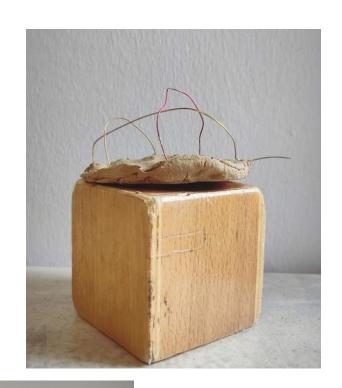


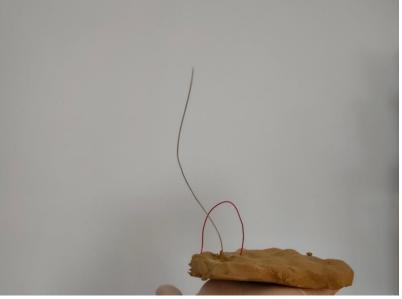


Sculpture

For all the sculpture projects, the main idea was based on children having their own visual understanding and creating figures as they imagined. They were inspired by something then they created their own version.



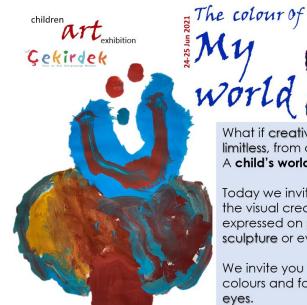




Exhibition

Art project in collaboration

As an artist, I have been inspired by the children's minds and worlds, and the way that they create and connect to art. This led me to create a project in collaboration with them, which was a unique and special experience.





Statement:

Paper that had been torn and left out in the sun, the wind and the rain was given to children between two and six years old. This damaged, imperfect paper represented crisis and sadness. The children were told that this paper was sad and were asked to make it happy or to paint happiness onto it in an attempt by the artist to investigate a philosophical question: "What is happiness in the mind of a child?" It seems that they can find it easily, even in places that adults would find inhospitable. These paintings are pictures of happiness from children's points of view, hanging in an installation of joy in an abandoned, devastated ruin. Children are happiness hunters. Out of nothing, they have vision. They can still see the colours which are lost to view as we become adult.

A little girl painted some colour on a piece of paper. When asked what it showed, she simply said "This is me." She saw herself as happiness.
